



A QUICK GUIDE ON RETURNING TO COLLEGE

TOP 10 QUESTIONS ANSWERED

1. How will I pay for college?

The first step in paying for college is to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) since this information is used to determine eligibility for federal, state, and university scholarships and grants.

- **Scholarships:** UNO has a General Application for scholarships, but you'll need to apply for admission to access the application site.
- **Financial Aid Resources:** EducationQuest Foundation is a great resource for helping you find financial aid sources, no matter what college you decide to attend.
- **Tuition Reimbursement:** You may also be eligible for tuition reimbursement through your employer. Check with your Human Resources Department to see if your employer offers this benefit.

2. How long will it take me to graduate?

That depends. If you have past college credit, standardized exam credit (like AP, IB, CLEP or DSST), and/or military credit or training, then you're already on your way to completing your degree.

How many classes do you plan to take each semester? Do you plan to take summer classes? We want to learn more about your plans so we can help you determine your path to degree. We recommend you meet with an academic advisor to discuss your past, your present, and your future to map out a degree completion plan that's uniquely yours.



3. Are there other students like me who attend UNO?

Absolutely, 100%, yes! A few numbers that might help:

- 1,400+ students enrolled this year in the Bachelor of Multidisciplinary Studies program
- 25,000+ students have graduated from our program
- 25% are military-affiliated students
- 50% are first-generation students (the first in their family to go to college)

Our students represent a diverse, multi-generational population so there's no "one type" of student who enrolls in our program, which is what makes the college experience rewarding for you, your fellow students, and our faculty. We have students decide who return to school in their late 70s. We have students who take all of their classes online. We have students who mix and match online and on campus courses. It's never too late to pursue your goal of completing your degree.

4. Will my past credits transfer?

Did you know that transfer credits never expire? Of course, there are a few exceptions to this rule (such as a science courses if you're planning to pursue premed). Whether it's college courses you've taken in the past, standardized exams you've passed (like CLEP or DSST), or military training you've acquired, it likely applies to your degree program.

Unofficial Transcript Evaluation: The best way to find out if and how your credits transfer is to request an unofficial transcript evaluation. It's free to you. All you need to do is provide the documents so that we can tell you exactly how your past credits apply to your program.

5. Who will help me navigate my journey?

We have a whole team of people dedicated to helping you succeed. You'll be paired with a professional academic advisor who will help you navigate the college process. From your first contact with our office, to course selection, to accessing campus resources – we're here to help you get to the finish line!

6. How do I juggle school with my other responsibilities?

Great question! And one that many of our students ask when thinking about returning to college. We want to get to know you and your specific situation so we can recommend the best approach to completing your degree.

- Perhaps it's starting off with a course or two to "get your feet wet" while juggling work and family.
- Perhaps it's taking a few classes online and a few in person to add flexibility to your schedule.
- Perhaps it's attending full-time to get you across the finish line faster.

Whatever your unique circumstances, we'll work with you to fit education in your life.

7. Will I have to take an entrance exam?

No. We have an open admission policy, which means that tests like the SAT and ACT are not required. If you haven't taken a college-level math course, you will need to take a math placement test after you've been admitted to our program – but don't worry. The placement test helps us ensure that you're set up for success and placed in the right class for you.

8. What should I do if I need help with my classes?

It depends. In addition to the faculty who teach your courses, we offer academic support services (like tutoring and writing assistance). Your academic advisor is always available to help connect you with assistance, so there's no need to figure it out on your own. We know it takes courage to ask for help, so kudos to you for taking that step.

9. What kind of technology will I need?

Access to a computer or tablet and the internet will make your college process go a lot smoother. If you're taking online or remote courses, a webcam with microphone is also essential.

Our Information Technology Services office has a student laptop and wifi hotspot borrowing program if you don't have the technology you need. It's free to enrolled students.

10. What's my next step?

That's up to you. If you're ready to get started, apply now. If you're still investigating your college options, we recommend requesting an unofficial transcript evaluation and/or meeting with an academic advisor who will be able to answer many of your questions.
