We have a busy summer planned, filled with lots of fun and adventures. Please watch for details from each group throughout the summer months.

With summer upon us, many of the classroom outside activities will be in the morning, with some activities in the afternoons. The children/groups may go on walks, do activities around campus, go to the library, etc. If you will be picking up your child early for a particular day, please let us know, so we can plan for the day.

Library day is on Thursdays for each group; Toddlers from 9:20 to 9:40 AM, Transition from 9:40 to 10 AM, Preschool from 10 to 10:30 AM, and School-age from 10:30 to 11 AM. Each group usually leaves the center 15 to 20 minutes before Library start time. If you would like your child to participate in these fun learning activities, please try to have your child by 9:00 A.M. on Thursdays.

All summer contracts must be signed by Monday, June 12. New year-round contracts will come out in August when the fall semester starts. The new food program forms from 2023 to 2024 will go out in the middle of June. Every family must complete the top portion of the form. Even if you do not qualify, every family must update, complete/sign the form. Please look at your email inboxes for the forms. Thank you for your cooperation with updating these forms. All complete forms are due by July 5, 2023.

The school-age program will run from May 30 to August 11, 2023. There is a \$110.00 summer activity fee for each child. This fee covers the cost of field trips (transportation & fees), t-shirts, etc., and is non-refundable and will not be prorated for any missed field trips. Please make sure that you have received a packet of information from Miss Megan. The preschool summer packets have gone out and the summer activity fee is \$65 and covers the cost of field trips, t-shirts, etc. and is non-refundable and will not be prorated for any missed field trips. Please see Teacher Ky for packet information.

Finally, I will be out of the office on June 8, 26, 27 & 28. If you have any questions or concerns during these times, please see Ms. Monica or the lead teachers.

Summer is here!

Starting on Thursday, June 8, we will be going to the library on campus for story time at 9:40 AM. We will leave the center around 9:00 AM to make sure we arrive time, so please make sure your child is here by then. Each week your child will get to pick and check out a book that they will get to keep and read at school.

Our water play is here as well! We will be having water play every Wednesday morning, weather permitted. If you have not brought in items for your child to participate, please do so. Your child will need a swimsuit, water appropriate shoes, a towel, and a swim diaper if they are not yet potty-trained. You are more then welcome to bring a hat, sunglasses, and other sun protection items at your discretion.

Friday, June 16, will be our first Elmwood Park Field Trip. We will walk as a class to the park, play, and enjoy a sack lunch together before walking back for nap time. We will leave for the park at 9:00 AM, so please have your child at school no later than 8:45 AM. Your child will need a peanut and tree nut free sack lunch and drink that is totally disposable. Grownup volunteers are encouraged, so please let us know if you will be joining us at the park. Your child's permission slip will need to be signed and returned in order for them to join us on the field trip.

On Wednesday, June 21, we will have a Transition water balloon party here at the child care center. This event will be in place of water play for the day. Grownup participation is encouraged! The water balloons will be ready for throwing at 9:30 AM. Please let Miss Allison know if you will be joining our class for this event.

On Thursday, June 22, we will be enjoying a cold treat at Milo Bail Student Center. We will walk over in the morning at 9:00 AM, and return in time for lunch at 10:30 AM. If your child is joining us, we ask that you provide \$5 to cover the cost of the treat (ice-cream or popsicle).

Happy June! Summer is finally here, and we have a busy few months ahead of us here in Preschool!

Summer is full of plenty of fun activities here at the center, so please make sure to keep an eye on the calendar and emails you receive to ensure that your child is prepared for all of our activities! During the summer, Preschool will be spending most of our time outside- Please make sure that your child is coming to school each day dressed in appropriate summer clothing, shoes that allow them to play and walk easily, and keep their sunscreens stocked! In addition, Preschool will be traveling to the Library on Thursday mornings (beginning June 8th) and has Water Play on Fridays (beginning June 9), which occurs weekly until August. Please ensure your child is here **prior to 9:30 AM on Thursday mornings** so they are able to travel to the library with us. Stretch & Grow will also be offering a Monday Yoga and Wednesday Dance class for the Summer session (occurring both days from 3:15PM-3:45PM) Check out the informational brochures at the Front Desk for more information!

Our first Field Trip of the summer is on Friday, June 2, to the Henry Doorly Zoo! We will be leaving the center at 9 AM and returning around 2 PM. We will also be traveling to the OPPD Arboretum on Wednesday, June 14 and taking a walk to Elmwood Park on the morning of Wednesday, June 28. Finally, we will be taking a trip to the Student Center on Wednesday, June 21 for our First Ice Cream adventure! Please remember that for ALL Field Trips/Events this summer, we ask for your child to be here no later than 30 minutes before the start time of a Field Trip/Event. In addition, please remember that your child will need a peanut and tree nut free, completely disposable sack lunch for each scheduled Field Trip. Please ensure lunches are packed correctly and meet allergen guidelines, so Ms. Effie does not have to repack them!

Lastly, I will be on vacation in South Dakota from Saturday, June 10 to Sunday, June 18. If you need anything during this time, feel free to ask Alisha, Vivian, Miss Megan, or Ms. Dawn. We provide a positive learning experience for children that includes strategies to teach children to be inclusive as well as helping them to understand the many different aspects of culture, diversity and inclusion.

Raising an Inclusive Child

If we think of humanity as a large family, then to be inclusive means that everyone has a place at the table. No one is excluded, marginalized, or left out. Everyone has something to offer. As adults, we pass our values to children every day through what we say and do.

What Is Inclusiveness?

Too often, inclusiveness is described as something we should do to benefit others. Being inclusive is more than a moral obligation—although this alone is enough reason to practice it. When we are inclusive we aren't divided. Instead, our world becomes enlarged. We gain relationships and experiences that enrich us. We recognize that we are all different and that those differences bring joy to living.

Four Strategies to Raise an Inclusive Child

Here are four great ways where you, as a parent, can teach your child to have an inclusive attitude and approach.

- 1. Be a role model. Children follow what we do more than what we say, so it's important that our actions are sending the right message. This can be as simple as getting to know your neighbors as you're walking the dog or getting the mail. Be curious and reflective about your own biases, and be willing to learn something new. Speak up when you see discrimination or racism.
- 2. Teach compassion. It's not realistic to ask children to be "best" friends with everyone all the time, but elementary-age children in particular can learn to be friendly, respectful, and compassionate in a group setting, such as school. Teach your child to be aware of other children who might be new or who might feel left out. For example, challenge your child to include another child who is sitting alone at lunch or playing alone at recess.
- 3. Explain differences, don't ignore them. The world is a big place and we come from many religious, cultural, and ethnic backgrounds with different values, perspectives, identities, and family makeups. Help your child understand that differences make the world more interesting. They help us learn and appreciate other ideas beyond ourselves. Talk about and model how to respectfully share and learn about differences, as well as how to stand against discrimination in all its forms.
- 4. Use children's literature. Children's books are a great vehicle for exploring differences in culture, race, and ability, especially when the literature depicts authentic characters involved in relatable situations.

How to Help Children Understand Diverse Families

Our world is incredibly diverse and families are no different, with varying configurations, beliefs, cultural norms, and personal practices. One of the most important gifts we can give our children is to help them feel good about the uniqueness of their family and help them learn to accept, respect, and include people whom they may identify and experience as "different."

Answering Questions about Diverse Family Structures

Families come in many different structures and sizes. Young children often have questions when they notice families that seem different from their own. This is a great opportunity to share your values about families, diversity, and inclusion with your child. Here are a few ideas to guide the conversation.

Keep it simple. Young children generally don't need or want long, complex answers. Something like, "Cody lives with his grandmother. His grandmother is his family," or "Malia has two mommies. They are her family," are sufficient. Preschool children are concrete thinkers and not ready for a philosophical discussion.

Celebrate diversity. Children's growing awareness of diverse family structures provides rich opportunities to celebrate family diversity and engage children in conversation about who is in THEIR family, who lives in THEIR house, and more importantly, who takes care of them. Point out the wonderful, interesting diversity of families, which might include families with only children, families with many siblings, blended families, foster families, LGBTQIA2S+ families, multi-generational families, and many others. This diversity of families makes life richer.

Define what makes a family. Children tend to thrive when they come to understand there are varying family structures and that all families are wonderful, so long as the people in them love and care about each other. This repeated message helps children feel secure, even if their family configuration changes through death, separation, or other life events.

When children ask, "Can a family have two mommies?" one suggested response is: "Yes, some families may have two mommies, one mommy, no mommy, or even lots of mommies. And some families may have two daddies, one daddy, no daddy, or even lots of daddies. Some families also include grandparents, foster parents, aunts, and uncles. Other families have one child, no children, or many children. Any combination works. It's love that makes a family—just like in our family."
