##### UNO Child Care Center Closed

**Monday, January 19, 2026**—In observance of Martin Luther King, Jr. Day.  
We will re-open on Tuesday, January 20, 2026, at 6:30 A.M.

##### The UNO Child Care Center CLOSSES promptly at 5:30 P.M.

Please make sure you are here by 5:30 P.M. to pick up your child. Your account will be charged \$1.00 late pick -up fee for every minute you are late picking up your child past 5:31 PM and you will be responsible for paying this fee. If you are unable to be here by 5:30 P.M., please make other arrangements to have someone else pick up your child. You need to call the Child Care Center and let us know. We thank you for your cooperation in this matter.

##### Winter Weather Outside Play

The children do play outside and will go for walks on campus. With the weather getting cooler, please make sure your child has a jacket/coat, hat, and/or gloves for outdoor play. As long as the temperature, including wind chill, is above 32 degrees, the children will be able to play outdoors.

##### Illness Reminder

As wintertime approaches, so do illnesses. Remember that if your child is experiencing any illness type symptoms, to please keep them at home. If your child develops a fever of 100.4 or above, your child must be fever free without the aid of Tylenol or Ibuprofen before they can return. If your child has vomited or had diarrhea 2 or more times in a 24-hour period, and/or develop additional symptoms, they must be out for 24 hours, symptoms improving before returning. If your child is diagnosed with an illness, please let us know.

##### Inclement Weather Guidance

Please listen to your local news and radio stations for updates on closings or check the UNO announcement web page. If you see that UNO has closed, then the UNO Child Care Center is also closed. If UNO has a late start, the UNO Child Care Center will open 30 minutes prior to the start time. Example: If UNO has a 10 A.M. late start, the UNO Child Care Center will open at 9:30 A.M. If UNO closes early, the UNO Child Care Center will close 30 minutes after that time. (Example: If UNO closes at 3 P.M., then the UNO Child Care Center will close by 3:30 P.M.). I will send out an email to families and staff informing you of any closures or late starts. Please make sure that we have your correct or updated email address(es).

### Omaha Public Schools and Bellevue Public Schools Kindergarten Round-up Information

Does your child turn five by July 31, 2026? Enroll your child in kindergarten for the 2026-27 school year. We cannot wait to meet them! This year, all elementary schools will hold a district-wide **Kindergarten Registration on Jan. 16, 2026**. This replaces the former Kindergarten Round-up.

This exciting event brings families together at their [neighborhood school](#) to get ready for kindergarten next year. Your child will meet teachers and spend time in their future classrooms while you learn about the school and register.

This event is the best way to get connected before school begins in August.

Choose your time to visit your neighborhood school on Jan. 16, 2026:

- Session 1: 2 - 3 p.m.
- Session 2: 4:30 - 5:30 p.m.

No need to sign up. Pick what works best for your family - both sessions offer the same great experience!

- Meet school leadership, staff and other families
- See learning spaces and materials
- Get help registering your student
- Activities for your student while you learn more about the school

Bring these documents along to help with registration:

- Birth Certificate – student must be five years old before July 31
- Proof of Address - Acceptable documents must have the name of the parent/guardian and current within 3 months:
  - OPPD / MUD utility statements
  - Cox Cable or Century Link statements
  - Mortgage Statements
  - Rental agreements
  - HHS Statements (dated)
- Immunization Records (if available)

### 4 Things Kindergarten Teachers Want You to Know

Kindergarten teachers are passionate about partnering with the families of their students. When families and teachers work together, kids win! Here are four things that kindergarten teachers want you know.

#### 1. Parents Play a Critical Role

Kindergarten teachers value you as your child's first teacher. They are honored to take their place as another significant adult in your child's life. Kindergarten teachers want to facilitate your child's continued development and help him learn how to be a successful student in a school setting.

##### What you can do:

- Welcome your child's kindergarten teachers as an important partner in your child's development.
- Share what you have discovered about how your child learns and include examples of times when your child has learned something new.

#### 2. The Value of Families and Teachers Working Together as Partners is Research-Based

Research tells us that when families are involved, children do better academically and socially. Kindergarten teachers are committed to developing a collaborative partnership with your family on behalf of your child's growth and development.

##### What you can do:

- Tell the teacher that you sincerely want to work with them to help your child learn and grow.
- Ask the teacher to offer specific ideas and strategies that will involve you in your child's learning.

#### 3. Communication is Key

Communication with families is such a high priority that kindergarten teachers are willing to use a variety of methods to correspond. Some parents prefer to connect via email or text, while others prefer to receive a phone call or a printed letter in their child's backpack. Kindergarten teachers want to communicate in the ways that make sense for you and your family.

##### What you can do:

- Ask the teacher the best way to access information about the classroom and the school.
- Share with the teacher your preferred method of communication.

#### 4. Teachers Want to Know What Makes Your Family Unique

The families we work with have varied backgrounds and different configurations. Kindergarten teachers want you to know that they value the distinctiveness of your family. Learning about those qualities and values that make your family unique, improve our ability to partner in the healthy development of your child.

##### What you can do:

- Tell your child's teacher about the unique characteristics of your family.
- Let the teacher know about family changes and challenges at home that may impact your child's attitudes and behaviors at school.

Building bridges between kindergarten teachers and families is an important step in supporting your child's learning and development.
