INNERDANCE: EXPERIENCE OF A WAKEFUL DREAMSTATE

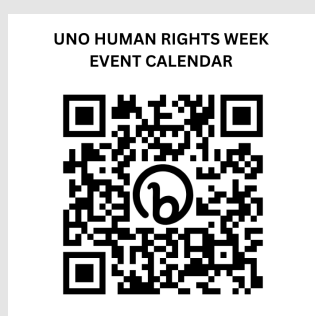
