

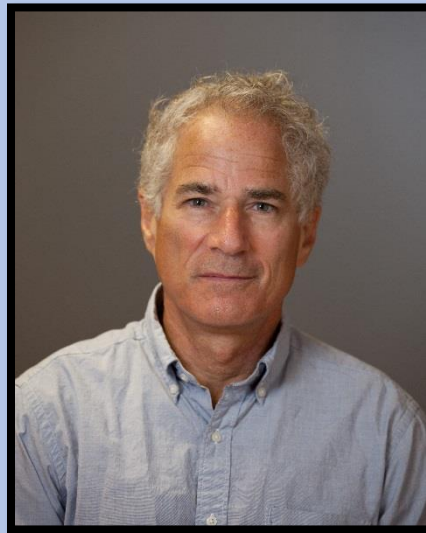
2018 MISSOURI VALLEY HISTORY CONFERENCE

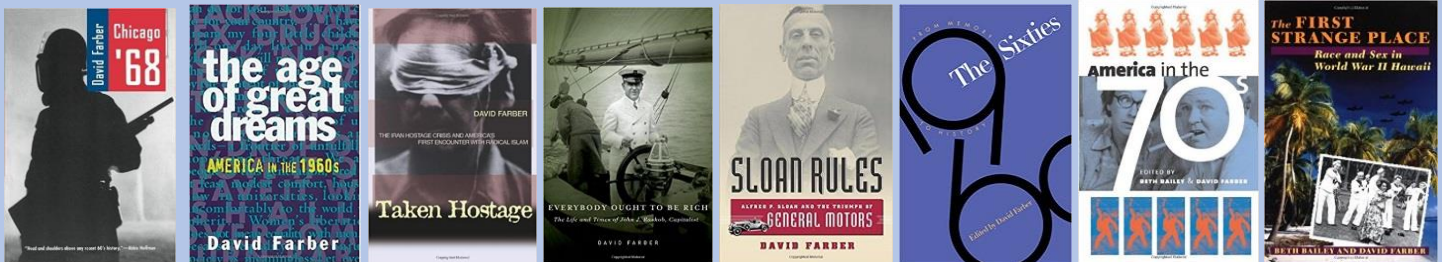

David Farber is the Roy A. Roberts Distinguished Professor of History at the University of Kansas. His books include *Chicago '68*, *The Sixties: From Memory to History*, *Everybody Ought to be Rich*, and *The Rise and Fall of Modern American Conservatism*. His history of the American Sixties, *The Age of Great Dreams*, has been taught in over 1000 college classrooms. He has lectured on American political history all over the United States and in China, Russia, Lebanon, Indonesia, Japan, Germany, France, Canada, Australia, the Netherlands, and the United Kingdom.
