
ICHICANA POWER!

Dr. Maylei Blackwell is an interdisciplinary scholar activist, oral historian, and author of "Chicana Power! Contested Histories of Feminism in the Chicano Movement." Her research has two distinct, but interrelated trajectories that broadly analyze how women's social movements in the U.S. and Mexico are shaped by questions of difference such as race, indigeneity, class, sexuality or citizenship and how these differences impact the possibilities and challenges of transnational organizing. Her most recent research with farm worker women and indigenous migrants seeks to better understand these new forms of grassroots transnationalism.
