Readings:

All readings will come from the assigned text book or from journal articles that are

available online. Specific pages and articles to read for class will be assigned one class prior.

Students are encouraged to read all assigned material and be ready and able to discuss in class.

Place Names:

There will be two lists of place-names provided for studying throughout the semester, one

list for Mexico and the other list for Central America and the Caribbean. There will be a short

section of place-name identification on each exam.

Exams:

There will be three (3) exams throughout the semester. Each exam is worth 100 points

and consists of name-place identification, multiple choice, short answer, and essay. There will be

three main section exams and the final will not be comprehensive.

Book Review:

All students must chose one book from the class reading list or find a book and have it

approved by the instructor. They must read it and provide a three to five (3-5) page review of the

book by the end of the semester. Paper must be between 3 and 5 pages, double spaced, Times

New Roman text, and 12 point font. The book review is worth 100 points, and is due three (3)

weeks before the final class.

Grading:

There will be 300 points from exams, 100 points for the book review, and 100 points for attendance, participation, and in-class discussion, for a total of 500 points throughout the semester. The UNO standard grading guidelines will be observed.

This course will focus on the evolution, contrast, and development of human landscapes throughout Middle America and the Caribbean. These landscapes have been influenced by indigenous histories, European contact and culture, western development, regional conflicts, and peace resolutions.
