The research examines the dynamics surrounding the integration of newly-arrived Latino residents to historically white, rural communities in Northeast Nebraska. The recent rise in the United States of anti-immigrant sentiments has elevated the difficulties Latino immigrants face. The focus on ethnic identity formation, with an emphasis on the ways in which community and family are constructed, circumscribe the more general topics of work, housing, education, health care, poverty and the criminal justice system. The study represents an important step toward understanding current Latino immigration to Nebraska and the Northern plains states.
