Allen Curtis received a bachelor of science degree in criminal justice from UNO in 1974. A 1960 graduate of Hastings High School, Curtis also earned a master of arts degree from the University of Nebraska _ Lincoln in 1977. Allen retired as chief of police of the Lincoln Police Department (LPD) in 1994 after 23 years of service. In 1994, Allen was appointed by Governor Nelson to be the executive director of the Nebraska Crime Commission. During his tenure there, the commission has more than doubled the number of services and grant_funded programs available to help local communities address victim, youth, drug, violent crime and other criminal justice problems and needs. Mary Heng-Braun has served as the senior director of donor services at the Omaha Community Foundation since 2000. Mary was also critical in the development of the Latina Resource Center, the Domestic Violence Coordinating Council, and the Neighborhood Center for Greater Omaha. In conjunction with the Mammel Foundation, she developed and implemented the OXYGEN (Omaha's Next Generation) _ a leadership program for younger donors that resulted in a \$40,000 grant to One World Health Center.
