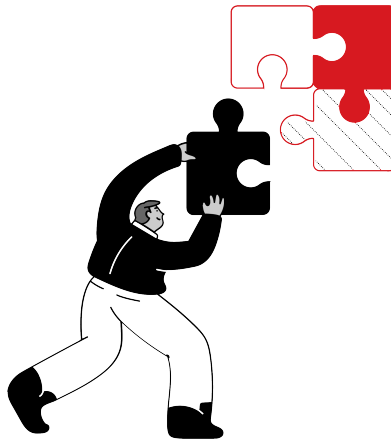


Course Description

This highly interactive experience will provide foundational knowledge and skills to those seeking understanding and growth in restorative justice practices. Through an introduction of theory and hands on skill practice, participants will deepen their understanding of why restorative practices are essential in all spaces. Participants will leave this course with skills to begin using restorative justice approaches with clients, in their workplaces, and personal lives.

8. Understand the impact on victims participating in the process
