Hospital seeks to fulfill community outreach goals

Under new direction, facility also expanding services

There are exciting changes taking place at Chadron Community Hospital, with a new leadership team leading the charge.

Under the direction of new CEO Anna Turman, the hospital is expanding services and focusing more on community outreach. Prior to assuming the head role, Turman served as the hospital's chief operating officer for the last four years, and was CIO for a decade. The Hay Springs resident has a master's degree in healthcare administration and has spent a total of 16 years working for Chadron Community Hospital.

Turman was named chief executive officer last year, succeeding Harold Krueger, who retired. There have been several other retirements, leading to the staffing changes, but Turman said the hospital is well suited to adapt, in large part because of the community it calls home.

"I love this community," she said. "They have that pioneering attitude. It's the right type of people to be working in healthcare."

Joining Turman on the leadership team is chief financial officer Jennifer Brown and chief patient care officer Jessi Grote.

The trio of women know that as the hospital rises to meet the new challenges of the healthcare industry they can be successful and provide the community access to quality care. The large geographic region the hospital provides services for necessitates a focus on wellness over the entire life span, Turman said.

The hospital's efforts earned the facility a Community Star award last November, a recognition by the National Organization of State Offices of Rural Health for National Rural Health Day. The hospital's home health and hospice program was highlighted in the 2017 edition for its dedication, innovation and collaboration in serving a five-county area in the Panhandle.

was also named to the 19th annual Health Care's Most Wired list, released in 2017 by the American Hospital Association's Health Forum. The list recognizes facilities that use smart phones, telehealth and remote monitoring to create better access to health care.

"The Most Wired hospitals are using every available technology option to create more ways to reach their patients in order to provide access to care," said AHA President and CEO Rick Pollack in a press release when the list was published. "They are transforming care delivery, investing in new delivery models in order to improve quality, provide access and control costs?

In addition to the organization-wide awards, individual staff members have been recognized as well. Alisha Obando was one of 66 employees statewide honored

Outreach efforts continue on the other end of the life spectrum, as hospital staff work to increase awareness of the need for advance directives. Hospital staff created a video "12 Days of Illness" to enter into Athena Health's "My Hospi-December. The video earned second place in the competition and the hospital was awarded a \$7,000 grant as a result. The funds will be used to encourage the community to sign advanced directives.

"We want to focus on the legacy we are leaving outside our walls," Turman said.

In the last year, Chadron Community Hospital has also opened its on-site MRI and has a functioning chemotherapy room now. Grote said the MRI and chemo room have been huge assets to patients, eliminating the need for travel and in some cases speeding up their treatment. In the case of the MRI, patients previously had to jockey for six slots a week when the mobile unit visited. With the hospital's fully functioning MRI in-house, most appointments can be accommodated within 48 hours

The chemotherapy room was recently added and is utilized solely for chemotherapy patients. Previously, the IV therapy room was utilized as a dual purpose room. The change has ensured patient confidentiality and comfort during treatment.

A recent diabetes education grant will also allow the facility to move forward with another program, certifying the hospital's diabetes education program. Chadron Community Hospital is one of the few facilities in the state to have a certified diabetic educator on staff, and the grant will allow the program itself to be certified, too. The goal is to have the certification completed by the end of the year, Grote said.

In order to provide that quality care, the hospital also focuses on the education and well-being of its employees. An internal scholarship program gives employees the chance to continue their education, and seven employees have now graduated from the Leadertal, My Community" contest in ship Institute, a collaboration between the Nebraska Hospital Association and Bellevue University.

A wellness program for staff also has strong administrative support, and Diane Lecher organizes the effort, which includes healthy snacks, exercise challenges and more.

'We also have to make sure they're healthy," Turman said of the employees.

The hospital is also keeping an eye on the future, offering scholarships to high school students who want to pursue a career in healthcare. The funding for the scholarships comes from current employees donating to the cause to wear jeans on certain days. The staff is investing in the community and the future healthcare providers, Turman said.


That's an important aspect given the challenges the healthcare industry is facing, she continued. The hospital needs to maintain agility, with an educated staff intentionally using data to create and carry out a strategic plan that meets the communities needs.

It's exciting to be part of an organization that has a unified goal and plans to meet that goal, Brown said.

"It's empowering to be a team together," she said.

Turman agreed, noting that meeting the hospital's "lofty" goals takes a good team, all working together. That's something she believes is in place at Chadron Community Hospital, from the housekeepers to the administrative team.
